

5 Ornamental Trees & Shrubs for Lovely Winter Scenery

After the last of the autumn leaves have faded and fallen, the winter landscape can seem dull and dreary. But it doesn't have to be that way. There are many ornamental trees and shrubs suited to our climate that provide color and interest all year long – including winter. Here are five of our favorites.



Firethorn – Also known as pyracantha, firethorn is a thorny evergreen shrub that belongs to the rose family. Its pretty white flowers during spring and summer give way to gorgeous, thick clusters of crimson berries that provide a burst of color all winter long. The hardy, drought-tolerant shrub is also very easy to grow.

Junipers – Want a fast-growing evergreen to enliven your winter landscape? Junipers are a good choice. These cold-hardy trees and shrubs, which are picturesque in any season, produce blue and purple berries during the cold months. The berries, in turn, attract colorful cardinals, blue jays, and other songbirds – adding another layer of interest to the winter scenery.

3 Red Twig Dogwood – This unique bush looks beautiful in every season. Enjoy fragrant white blossoms in the spring, bluish-white berries in the summer and fall, and absolutely stunning, brilliant red branches all winter long.

Winterberry – The winterberry shrub is a species of holly. But unlike the holly many of us associate with Christmas, the winterberry sheds its leaves in the fall and gives rise to dense clusters of cheerful, bright red berries.

Yew Tree – This majestic evergreen is known for its long life, with some enduring for 600 years. While its needles and seeds are toxic to many animals, its berry-like seed coverings, called arils, are not. In fact, the gorgeous red arils not only lend a pop of color to the season, but also attract a host of winter birds that safely feed on them.

But for a kid who might get a day off from school and the rare opportunity to play in the snow, winter can seem magical.

No matter how you feel about it, there's no denying that winter, like each of the other seasons, has its own unique brand of "magic" or wonder. So, I thought I'd share some winter fun-facts to help take the bite out of our chilliest season.

People born during winter are less irritable. While people born during the spring and summer months

We'll make a FREE service call to check out your lawn and provide an estimate for treatment.

ORNAMENTAL TREE & SHRUB TREATMENTS

Pest Control

Gold, Gold Plus & Platinum. We treated ornamental trees and shrubs with dormant oil to protect them from destructive pests that overwinter in these plants. We'll apply a second treatment with Application #1 in the new year.

WHAT YOU NEED TO DO UNTIL OUR NEXT VISIT

Keep Lawns Free of Leaves

Leaf build-up makes the treatments we apply less effective. It can also smother lawns and promote diseases.

Raise Your Mower Blade

For warm-season grasses, including Bermuda and Zoysia, increase the height of your mower blade about a half-inch. Letting grass grow a little longer allows it to store up more nutrients to get through winter and flourish in the spring. It's safe to mow shortly after we've treated your lawn; just be sure the grass is dry to the touch.

Water Wisely

It's okay to water your lawn in December if it seems dry. But be sure to drain and shut down your irrigation system if freezing temps are predicted. No one wants burst pipes!

tend to have "excessively positive temperaments," they're also "more likely to experience rapid shifts in mood," according to 2011 research published in the Journal of Affective Disorders.

Thundersnow is a rare, but real, weather phenomenon. It's a rare weather phenomenon that refers to a snowstorm complete with both thunder and lightning. For thundersnow to occur, "the air layer closer to the ground has to be warmer than the layers above, but still cold enough to create snow," according to CNN.

Snow can be yellow, orange, green, and purple. We may think of snow as being pristinely white, but technically, it's completely colorless. Despite that fact, tiny particles of dust or algae can make snow appear to be a range of different rainbow-like colors, including yellow, orange, green, and even purple, according to The Old Farmer's Almanac.

Snow rollers are self-forming snowballs. According to National Geographic, snow rollers are "the cold-weather equivalent of tumbleweeds." Apparently, "wind pushes snow across the ground, gathering it into a hollow cylinder" and creating these self-forming snowballs.

There are plenty of flowers that bloom in the winter. If you're looking to dig into some dirt and don't want to wait until spring, try growing winter pansies, lenten roses (which are also known as Christmas roses), winter aconite, and snowdrops.

Snow comes in five categories. There is dry snow (zero percent water), moist snow (less than 3 percent), wet snow (between 3 percent and 8 percent), very wet snow (between 8 percent and 15 percent), and, finally, slush, or snow that is 15 percent water.

At least a septillion snowflakes fall from the sky every year, according to the Library of Congress. To put it another way, that's 1,000,000,000,000,000,000,000 snowflakes or a trillion trillion.



Snowflakes almost always have six sides. The largest snowflake on record allegedly measured 15 inches wide and 8 inches thick. It was found in 1887 by a ranch owner in Fort Keogh, Montana, according to The New York Times.

The tallest snowperson on record stood over 122 feet. Residents living in Bethel, Maine, took the tradition to the extreme in Feb. 2008, when they spent a month building a Guinness World Recordsetting snowperson—who was, in fact, a snowwoman named Olympia.

Winter increases your appetite. When it's cold, your body needs to work harder to keep your temperature at a comfortable level, which requires more energy to burn. To supply that extra energy, your body needs more calories, and that means you might notice an increase in your appetite. The first Winter Olympics were held in the French Alps in 1924. The first competition was held back in 1924 at the base of Mount Blanc in a spot called Chamonix, according to History. com. There were a total of 14 events across six different sports, including ski jumping and bobsledding.

The Earth is closest to the Sun

during winter. Earth's orbit is not a perfect circle. It is elliptical, or slightly oval-shaped. This means that the distance between the Earth and the Sun is not always the same. In the Northern Hemisphere, the closest point occurs in early January, and the far point happens in early July.

People once believed that birds flew to the moon for the winter.

Until the 19th century, some people — including Aristotle — believed that birds spent the cold season in hibernation at the bottom of the sea. Others believed that they took a much longer trip and flew to the moon for the winter, according to Atlas Obscura.
